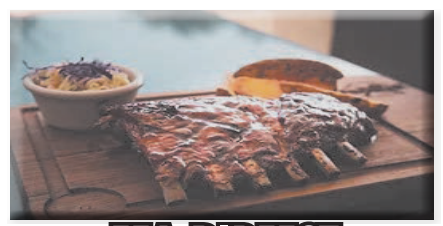

Beer Garden on Grounds

GENERAL INFORMATION

Pavilion: The Pavilion will host some of the 4-H shows.

The school exhibits will be displayed in the air-conditioned Pavilion this year.

Main Gate: The main gate to the fair is the west gate on Lucas Street. Fair-goers coming from the south on Highway 13 simply go straight north at the curve just north of the courthouse. Those coming from the north will make a sharp left turn at the same curve. This will be the main exit gate also.

Walk-in Gate: The center gate on Brown Street is a walk-through gate only. No cars will be permitted to enter through this gate.

Exhibitor Gate: A gate on Second Street, one block east of the walk-in gate, is meant mainly for livestock exhibitors.

Veggie Palace: Enclosed portion of the livestock building will house open class veggies and FFA exhibits. It will also house open class arts, crafts, floral and homemaker exhibits. All open class premiums will be paid out on Sunday. Any premiums not picked up will be forfeited and not mailed out unless arrangements are made.

Fair Center: The large tan and green building is the site of 4-H and Home Extension exhibits as well as the 4-H office.

Headquarters: This is the office of the Pierce County Agricultural Society from which fair-goers can obtain information about activities. Announcements are made from here.

Parking: No charge is made for parking automobiles, but autos MUST occupy space set aside for that purpose. There is ample room for parking so that any car can be taken out at any time. The board assumes no liability for car or contents.

Responsibility: While the greatest possible care will be taken by the management to protect patrons of the Pierce County Fair, each

individual will be held personally responsible for his or her own actions. All possible diligence or care will be exercised to prevent loss or injury to articles or animals on exhibition, but it is hereby expressly stipulated that the management of the fair will in no way be responsible should any loss or injury occur.

Dual Competition: 4-H AND FFA LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS CAN COMPETE IN OPEN CLASSES.

Machinery: Can be displayed on the grounds with a current fair sponsorship or a minimum \$100 donation with approval.

Miscellaneous: No animals or articles can be entered in more than one class.

Articles which have won premiums in previous years will not be awarded premiums again.

The age of all animals shall be computed from the last day of the month in which they are born.

All stock must be owned by exhibitor at least 30 days prior to the opening of the fair.

All open class entries must be in place between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. of the first day of the fair, Wednesday, July 22.

All open class will be released at 4 p.m. (animals can release at 2 p.m.) Sunday, July 26.

Exhibitors are responsible for their own livestock at all times.

Judges award all premiums which are paid on Sunday at the headquarters office. The Agricultural Society is not responsible for a premium after 90 days.

Power Wheels Derby (For Kids) Rules

POWER WHEELS for KIDS rules

1. Any regular size electric Power Wheel is allowed.
2. Kids 4-10 years of age may participate.
3. **Helmets must be worn.**
4. You are allowed **UPTO** a 12-volt lawn mower battery (battery **CANNOT** be mounted in the passenger seat); battery **MUST** be secured and sealed away from the child.
5. All doors and tailgates **MUST** be strapped shut. No sharp edges; use zip ties or duct tape or other flexible product for keeping shut.
6. Tires may be covered in duct tape to prevent them from breaking.
7. **MOTOR MUST REMAIN STOCK. ONLY MODIFICATION ALLOWED IS USING A LAWN MOWER BATTERY.**
8. Decorative changes can be made to power wheel to make it look like a derby car, however, it cannot reinforce the power wheel (only add decoration — example: header pipes sticking up).
9. Please remember this is for the kids! If there are modifications that are made that should not have been, your child will not be able to run, and will be very disappointed.

Best In County Quilts And Textile Arts

Best in County Quilts: This contest will be part of the quilt department and entries will be displayed in the quilt hall of the exhibition building.

Best in County Textile Arts: This contest will be part of the textile arts department and entries will be displayed in the Fonner Park Concourse, textile arts area.

Rules for each contest: Each county may select its one best quilt to enter in Best in County Quilts and their one best needlework item other than a quilt to enter in Best in County Textile Arts. The entry for each contest must be selected at the local county fair.

In the case of joint county fairs, each county may have one entry in each of the Best in County contests. If a county fair is held during or after the NSF, the exhibit will be eligible to compete the following year. The exhibitor must be a resident of the county submitting the entry. If a second person is involved in the exhibit (i.e. a commercial quilter), that person must be a Nebraska resident. If the first-place exhibitor declines, an alternate exhibitor may enter. The entry in each contest must be one that would qualify to be entered into an existing class in the respective NSF department. Not all county fair department classes are consistent with state fair department classes (i.e. quilted table runners and some other quilted items are in the textile arts department at the state fair.) Review the various classes available in the quilt and textile arts departments. See Domestic Entry Books at www.statefair.org. All entries must comply with all rules of the respective NSF departments.

- All drivers must attend the drivers meeting before races begin for safety, rules, and regulations briefing.
- Full-face helmet with face shield or race goggles (no sunglasses).
- Driving apparel includes Neck collar, Long pants and Long-sleeved shirt/jacket, gloves, Closed-toe shoes.
- Kart Requirements: Full body, Chain guard, Disc brake guard, Properly functioning brakes, Single cylinder engines only.
- Each individual kart can only be registered in “ONE” class. The kart can have multiple drivers if they are in different age brackets. The Pierce County “Hall of Fame” was started in 1983 when the award was given posthumously to Irvin Schomberg, longtime fair booster. A plaque was presented to his wife and family and his picture has been hung in the “Hall of Fame” area of the Fair and 4-H Center on the fairgrounds, as is each year’s recipient.

Other recipients have been Mae Malone, floral hall enthusiast; Emil Reikofski, longtime agricultural society president; Clara Parks, former county superintendent of schools who promoted participation in the fair; Owen and Betty Birch, longtime supervisors of the agricultural building; Carrol Pint, assistant at the fair for many years; Erwin Kolterman, longtime fair booster; posthumously to Malinda Thompson, who served many years in the floral hall; Henry Kumpost, longtime county extension agent; posthumously to Jason Wynn, an active 4-H member; Benjamin Fuelberth, 32-year member of the board of directors of the Pierce County Agricultural Society; Don Bernel, who served many years as 4-H leader, on the 4-H club committee and other groups;

Gerald Hixson, secretary of the ag society for 19 years and who now continues as honorary secretary; posthumously to Carl Neitzke, who spent years helping the fair, county and 4-H youth achieve goals and also helped with the horses at the fair; Norinda “Kreg” Cox who spent 40 years actively involved in fair activities and for many years scheduled the gate ticket takers and also worked at the gate;

Keith and Virginia Huwaldt, who continue to volunteer for the 4-H program and donate to 4-H scholarships and also, along with their son, continue to play an important role by trucking the fair livestock; Fair Board President Henry Stark who became a member of the Pierce County Agricultural Society Board more than 30 years ago and held the president position for more than 15 years.

Dwaine Ganseboom was recognized for his involvement with the tractor pull, being a past director of the fair board and furnishing cattle for calf riding.

Former Plainview News Publisher, Leonald Warneke was recognized for helping write articles and by-laws changing the Pierce County Agricultural Society as a membership organization. He was elected a director in 1966 and treasurer from December 1972-1985.

Joan Ganseboom of Osmond at age eight became a 4-H'er, then a Junior Leader. Following that was 40 years as a 4-H club leader with her children also joining 4-H. She served on the 4-H Council and Extension Board.

Carol Silhacek was honored for being a member of the Agricultural Society since 1972 and director since 1974; he and his Hesston tractor had become the official “fair bleacher movers.”

Jerry Jensen was recognized for his longtime commitment to fairs and being involved with saddle clubs, FFA cattle shows and judging and was a 4-H leader.

Fern Steinkraus was honored for being in charge of the flowers in the floral hall for more than 15 years.

Duane Buckendahl was selected for his support to 4-H as an organizer, leader, fair livestock superintendent, fair board director, and groundskeeper. He influenced his children and grandchildren to also be fair supporters.

Ron Korth was honored posthumously for his 4-H leadership and serving as dairy superintendent for more than 20 years.

Mary Bichlmeier was recognized for serving as treasurer for 23-plus years, with her responsibilities being year-round.

Delores Kumm of McLean was recognized for serving as co-superintendent of the floral hall for one year and then superintendent for 24 years, through 2007.

Phyllis Lieneman was honored posthumously for serving as 4-H clothing supervisor from 1970-90; she also sponsored the 4-H champion clothing construction award.

Don and Audra Huwaldt have been involved in the fair since the 1960s and continue to spend many hours assisting at the fair and transporting animals to livestock sale barns after the fair. Don is always on hand to move the bleachers for each event.

Bill and Sandy Buckendahl, former owners of Kolterman’s Farm Equipment, were honored in 2012. Bill and the couple’s two sons were Pierce 4-H members. They furnished machinery for displaying and use of it for moving bleachers and gates, and attended the fair and sold tickets at the gates.

Kelly and Dwayne Asmus were presented the award in appreciation of their work with the Pierce Saddle Club, the 4-H Horse Department, spear-heading many improvements to the horse barns and arena.

The 2014 Hall of Fame Award was presented to Shirley Hoffman for her service to the fair. Shirley was a third-generation volunteer. She was superintendent in the needlework department for more than 30 years.

LeRay and Karen Zierke were awarded in 2016 for their many years of service to the fair as parents and as members of the Ag Society, LeRay as president and Karen serving as Veggie Palace superintendent since 1989.

Peggy Haas received the award in 2017 for all her years as open class superintendent. In 2018, Linda Latimer and the late Randy Latimer received the award for their

many years of service in 4-H and archery.

Bill Schomberg received the award in 2019 for all his years serving on the board of directors.

Jim Herian and the late Diane Herian of Pierce received the award in 2020 for their dedication and service in a multitude of capacities to the Pierce County Ag Society

Bob and Janet Seegebarth received the award in 2021 for Bob’s many years on the fair board, Janet’s work in the open class vegetable division, and their work with the Hadar Horsemen and Happy Day 4-H clubs.

Kelli Koepke accepted the 2022 award posthumously for her husband Darin Koepke for his many years of devotion to the activities of the Pierce County Fair and the entire community.

In 2023 the award was given to Gene and Velma Thomsen of Plainview for their years of service and dedication to the Pierce County Fair and 4-H.

Leon Janovy was recognized in 2024 for his 60-year commitment to judging vegetable, in addition to a number of additional tasks that included selling tickets, storing campers, and involving FFA students in fair activities.

In 2025 Larry and Karen Foster were honored for their continued support towards agriculture and their long-time dedication to the Pierce County Fair.

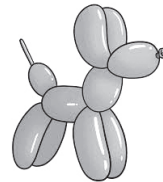
Rules for the award provide that nominations can be made for individuals, couples, families, organizations or business firms from within the boundaries of the county who have provided outstanding service to the cause of the Pierce County Fair, now or in the past.

A “Hall of Fame” committee, along with the executive board of the Pierce County Agricultural Society, reviews nominations and selects a nominee for the “Hall of Fame” each year. The award will be limited to one each year.

Selection shall be kept secret and announced for the first time at the county fair, when a plaque will be presented to the recipient and a picture later hung in the “Hall of Fame.”

In the event of the nomination of a deceased person, the rules indicate the nomination must be made for consideration no later than the second fair following the death of the individual. Nominations for individuals who have served in previous years and died more than two years prior to the deadline for nominations will be voided.

Nominations should be submitted to “Hall of Fame” committee members: Larry Foster, Scott Fritz, or Nick Schroth, prior to July 15.

Swine weigh-in will take place at 7:30 a.m. on Thursday, July 24. Market barrows and gilts must be farrowed on or after January 1 of the current year. Hogs are shown in market classes only. All hogs eligible for championship must weigh at least 230 pounds, and there is no upper weight limit. No weight allowances will be given. No hogs will be reweighed. All hogs will be

shown individually by the exhibitor within their respective weight division. Hogs will not be judged as a pen of two.

Swine must be shown without hair dressing compounds. This includes oil, powder, or any other coat dressing compounds. Only unadulterated water is permitted. Swine to be exhibited shall originate directly from a herd not under

quarantine for pseudo rabies. Under no circumstances may swine under quarantine be exhibited. Only swine not showing signs of infectious, contagious, and/or communicable diseases, will be allowed to show.

All livestock must be entered on entry day. Under no circumstances may animals under quarantine be exhibited.

General Health Requirements for All Animals:

Only animals not showing signs of infectious or contagious diseases will be allowed to show. Animals that have active ringworm, visible warts or abscesses, or showing signs of infectious or contagious diseases will not be allowed entry into the Pierce County Fair for exhibition and will not be allowed to remain on the premises.

A. All Exhibitors must comply with the respective Livestock Health Requirements. The livestock superintendents will examine all entries in their respective divisions at the time of check in. If there are any symptoms of any disease, a veterinarian will be called to help the project area superintendent determine if the animal can be exhibited at the expense of the exhibitor.

B. All shows will be "blow and go." Animals may be clipped, blown and brushed or combed to enhance their appearance. No adhesives are allowed. Alcohol, water, oil, foam or any water or alcohol-based products with no adhesives or glue qualities, or artificial colorings are permitted. These products include conditioners and commonly used sprays such as Kleen Sheen, Revive, Final Bloom, Pink Oil, white show foam, Freshen Up, Silk, and Sudden Impact.

C. 4-H or FFA Entered breeding animals are eligible to show in the Open Class show.

D. Exhibitors shall not add materials, natural or synthetic, which extend body shapes beyond normal limits. Unethical fitting/prohibited substance includes injections, feed additives, cutting or other artificial

means of removing or remedying physical defects or conformation (i.e. doctoring, doping, tubing, injecting or lifting or filling under the skin.)

E. No other commercial, business, or farm sale ads are to be in or on the livestock stalls except animal stall signs. Show boxes with family/farm names are permitted.

F. Registered breeding heifers will have tattoos checked to match registration papers at check-in. All bulls 11 months & older must be shown with a nose lead.

G. All judge's decisions are final.

H. If an animal requires emergency treatment, Superintendents and/or Fair board members are to be notified as soon as possible. All drugs administered to animals should be witnessed by Superintendent or a Fair board member and logged in Medication Log Book which will be kept in UNL Extension office on fairgrounds. Sick animals will be required to leave the fairgrounds. UNL Extension and Pierce County Fairboard reserves the right to drug test any animal it deems necessary, at expense of exhibitor.

I. All fans must be kept free of the aisles. No butt fans or free standing fans are allowed. Fans are

to be hung to the left of the animal. Fans must be unplugged while using blower.

J. Stall assignments will be made by Superintendents. Animals are to be in stalls from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m.

K. Tie-outs will be assigned by the superintendents. Free standing pens must fit into assigned space. Cow/calf pairs will have first priority on the east side of Horse Pole Barn.

L. Upon violation(s) of the above rules, Superintendent and Fairboard members will be consulted. The exhibitor's animal involved may be lowered one or two ribbon placings, forfeit premium money or

may be disqualified from the show and sent home from fairgrounds. If questions arise, the State Fair rules will be consulted. Final determination of consequences will be issued by Pierce County Fairboard.

In the Dairy classes, two animals per class per breed may be shown. If all animals in the Dairy Herd are producing cows, then 3 cows can be shown by one exhibitor. Each exhibitor is limited to one dairy herd.

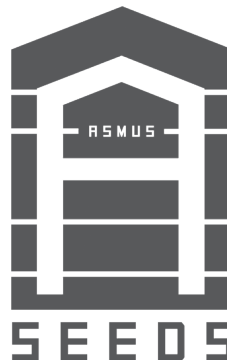

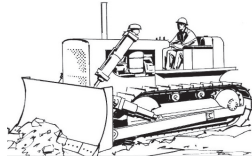

All Pierce County FFA members who are currently members of an FFA chapter, including those who will be freshmen in the fall, are eligible to compete in the Pierce County Fair.

FFA members with livestock will show with the 4-H. 4-H rules and regulations as they apply in the show ring will apply, with the exception of registration and pre-weighing. See the 4-H premium list for details. FFA members must register their animals with the FFA superintendent before June 30. If weights are a factor, scale weight at entry day applies. In the show ring, the FFA animal will be shown

with the 4-H, but judged on its own merit.

FFA ribbons and premium money will come from the FFA division. There is no competition between FFA and 4-H in the show ring. The same animal may not be shown in 4-H and FFA.

4-H rules apply to beef, dairy, sheep and horses. Herdsmanship will be judged by the FFA committee. Livestock exhibitors will participate in the showmanship contest.

FFA exhibitors will be permitted in the 4-H sale. They must notify the FFA superintendent and the 4-H person in charge.
